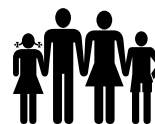
Announcements

A class for women beginning in October Jenny Monroe, Mindful Change Life Coach, will facilitate a course at the fellowship, meeting once a month on Tuesday or Wednesday evenings, 7 to 8:30 p.m., from October through May. Arts in the Area

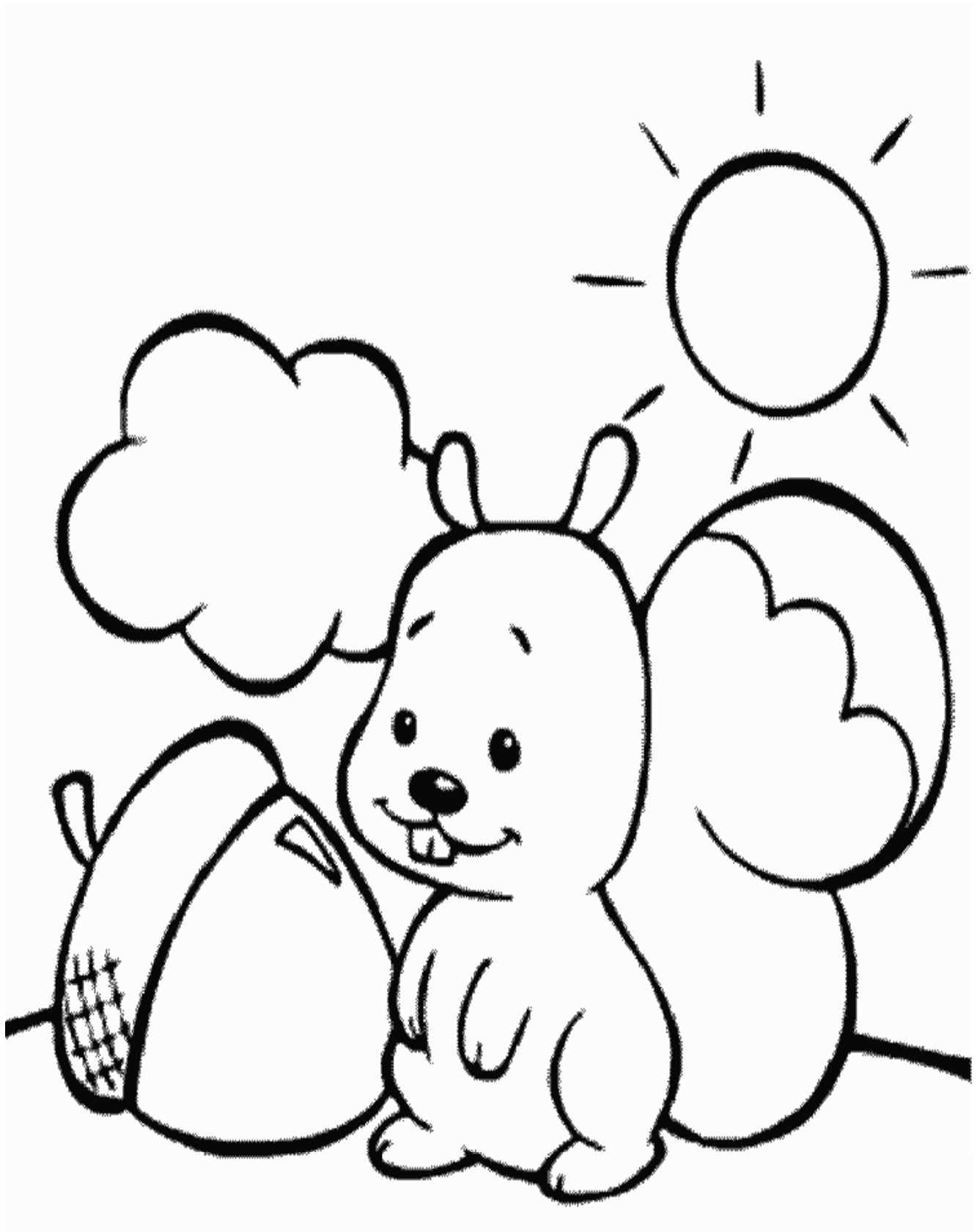


Four Fridays hosted at the new Community Arts building at 413 Lake Street in Elmira. Enjoy

music, poetry, artists, food and more from 4-8pm each Friday in September.

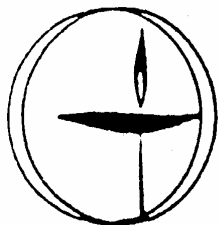
Cedar Arts Center
