Board Briefs:

At the board meeting on October 5, *Thank UUS* went to Alta Stevenson for keeping our weekly programs listed in the Star Gazette. We heard about the first meeting of the SET FORTH (Sanctuary Expansion Task-force) - that they have chosen to move forward with inviting architect Gary Wilson to advise on the possibility of adding a circular worship space to our existing building at the northwest corner. Our intent to apply for a Chalice Lighter's grant was deferred to the next grant cycle by the Chalice Lighters committee of the St. Lawrence District. They are advising us to continue with architectural plans, develop a five year plan, and attend a November 1st workshop with a team from UUFBF (see article elsewhere for details). Dave and Diane Muffley continue to work on a new sign for greater visibility from the highway. Leslie reported on Octagon Fair and successful spaghetti supper fundraisers. Next event for visibility/fundraising will be Sparkle of Christmas in Corning, Sat. Dec. 6th. Jen Spicer has asked the board to consider a pond for the trail she created in the back woods. Carolyn Scopelliti will be reducing the amount of RE furniture to make more space for people. Next board meeting will be Sunday, November 2, 9:15 a.m. - all are welcomed.

Leadership Development:

The St. Lawrence District (SLD) is our local association of 36 upstate NY congregations. Twenty of them have less than 100 members - like us. Growth and pastoral care are the two most common topics requested from congregational leadership. We pay dues to the SLD and have been full-share contributors for over a dozen years. On Saturday, November 1st at the Unitarian Church of Barnevald (east of Utica) a workshop called **Big Ideas for Small Congregations**, lead by Ellen Germann-Melosh, UUA consultant and co-author of "Big Ideas for Small Congregations: A Friendly Guide for Leaders" will be held. SLD Growth Committee is offering small congregations the opportunity to attend this day long training session. This is meant for those who are truly interested in promoting change in their congregations and in nurturing congregational growth. I have signed us up to have a team - so far Jenny, Leslie and Frank Potter are committed to go. We have room for three more members. If you can spend the day and wish to be part of our growth strategy team, please call me ASAP (607-524-8439). This opportunity for learning and growing - both personally and congregationally - will be awesome.

This workshop has two purposes - to offer stimulating possibilities to be taken back and practiced immediately in your congregations. It also serves as an invitation to engage in a discernment process for those who might be interested in participating in a three-year pilot project sponsored by the UUA. The pilot project is designed to grow a few committed small congregations within the St Lawrence District. As many as six congregations from the St. Lawrence district will be selected to participate in the three-year pilot program. Each participating congregation will commit to having a team of 4-6 congregants who will lead the process in their congregation while working with the UUA consultant. Applications will be available at the workshops for those congregations wishing to apply. Criteria for participation will be explained. Selection of

participants for the SLD will be made by the SLD Growth Committee. This application process is open to all congregations who have fewer than 100 members.

SLD News You Can Use:

What does that green banner by our door designate? The Creating Justice Banner Society Award honors congregations in which 25-49 percent of their membership are UUSC members. We are among nine congregations from the thirty-six that make up the St. Lawrence District with this award: First UU Society of Albany, UU Fellowship of Big Flats, First Universalist Church of Central Square, UU Church of East Aurora, UU Society of Northern Chautauqua in Fredonia, UU Congregation of Glens Falls, UU Church of Hamburg, May Memorial UU Society in Syracuse, and UU Church of Amherst in Williamsville.

If you are interested in deepening your understanding of UU-ism, meeting other UUs, and/or visiting nearby congregations - check out what's available. Two events coming up include on Saturday, November 15 a workshop: New Worship for a New Time: creating Engaged Celebration at First Unitarian Church of Rochester and over that weekend, November 14-16 in Binghamton a Youth Con (convocation) for high school aged UU youth to gather.

UU Fellowship of Chautauqua Denominational House

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Chautauqua, NY has purchased a large house on the Chautauqua Institution grounds and is currently renovating it for use as a Unitarian Universalist Denominational House. It will offer 6 bedrooms with shared bathrooms for weekly rentals of \$300/wk each for the 2009 season. Unitarian Universalists will be given preference for the rooms until December 1, 2008, and then the rooms will be available for the public. All rooms have two beds, one is designed as a family room, and another is handicapped accessible. The house has three full baths (one of which is fully handicapped accessible,) plus two half baths.

The UU Denominational House is centrally located near Bestor Plaza, the Bookstore and the Colonnade at 6 Bliss. It also offers a place to relax- including a secluded patio - for those coming for the day, information for persons interested in UU faith and philosophy, meeting space for programs, and social functions, too.

Several members of our UU Fellowship remember Arlene Spencer who attended services during the 80's and 90's. She grew up in the hamlet of Jackson Summit, PA, the daughter of a college educated farmer who belonged to the Unitarian Church of the Larger Fellowship and who evidently influenced Arlene in her liberal beliefs. Arlene enjoyed teaching elementary school in Jackson Summit, Millerton, and Elmira for many years, interrupting her career to join the WAVES during World War II. (Our own Gary Swarhout was one of her 5th grade students at Hoffman School.) She was a very giving person and of an independent and determined nature. She lived on Durland Avenue in Elmira for many years and kept her horse at a stable in west Elmira where she enjoyed riding on the Chemung River bank. Even though she died at the age of 90, she is missed by four of her classmates and by many other friends.

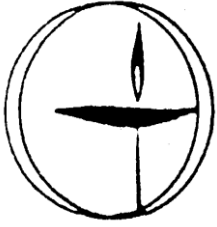
