50 years ago in Syracuse

Fifty years ago, shortly before noon on Saturday, October 31, 1959, a very important vote was taken in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Syracuse, in Syracuse, New York. After years of discussion, representatives of what was then the American Unitarian Association (AUA) and the Universalist Church of America (UCA) overcame the final obstacle and voted to adopt a common statement of purpose and a formal Plan for Consolidation, creating the new "Unitarian Universalist Association." Exactly 50 years later, we will gather in the very same Ballroom that they did to examine what they accomplished, how far we have come since 1959, and how far we have yet to travel.

The High School group will be working on the cottage, to create a proper and inspiring space for youth, as well as preparing to teach the children on the last Sunday of the month, (Teen Teach Sunday). Fifth to eighth grade students will embark upon the new UUA curriculum, Amazing Grace--Exploring Right and Wrong. Dave Muffley will lead September 13, Arthur Brenner on the 20th, and back to Dave the 27th. The Pre-K to fourth grade children will continue the harvest from the garden they planted in the Spring, then make muffins from the, fresh picked, patty pan squash to help nourish the whole fellowship. It is a tangible representation of the spiritual food that we give each other through our fellowship. The children will donate the remaining produce, (squash, tomatoes, onions), to the food bank to help feed the larger community. Seeds will be saved for next Spring. September 20 they will start on the UUA Faithful Journeys curriculum, which teaches how Unitarian Universalism translates into life choices and everyday actions. Sept. 27 they will continue under leadership from our high-school group.


