President's Ponderings

Dear Fellowship,

Thank-you, first of all, for your feedback on the surveys we did together. It is most appreciated. As a result of the mini-committee meetings, Christine Telford is not the Chairperson for the Buildings and Grounds Committee. As of this writing, I have not heard of any other committee changes. I strongly urge all committees to meet on a regular basis and the chairs should communicate to the board on a regular basis.

Some have suggested getting rid of the mowers and hiring a lawn service. That would be an awesome idea, except for the added cost. If it fits in the budget, we could look into that. It seems there are always lots of great ideas, but no one to take the ball and run with it. That is why the committees are key for communication. If you have an idea, please run it through the appreciate committee and then the chair can present it to the board. That is the structure we are building on.

In response to the inquires about the expansion, I can explain this way: The contractor is now non-responsive to my calls, the last of which was just yesterday. So we do not have the necessary CAD files the Setforth Committee needs to move forward. At this point, we need to meet again and discuss finding a new contractor with in-house drawing capabilities to get the CAD files done. Once that is completed and Charles Peck has assured us that everything is in line, we can then have a preconstruction meeting with the Town of Big Flats to find out what they are going to require us to test, have studied, or do to the property before construction can begin. Once we have satisfied the Town of Big Flats, we can move forward with applying for financing.
