

Curt, who has been playing hammered dulcimer for over 30 years now, has appeared at numerous festivals, coffee houses, contra dances and other venues about the state. The hammered dulcimer with its harp-like sound is augmented by Rob's backup on guitar, banjo and mandolin. Siegers has won fretted instrument guild awards in several state competitions and plays with ensembles about the Southern Tier. Together they present selections from numerous backgrounds including Celtic, French Canadian, Americana, 'Old-Timey' and tunes both old and new. Siegers, on banjo, is renowned for his renditions of classic jazz and blues tunes from the 20s and 30s. They're sure to put in some Holiday classics also. Last month in this very space I said, "The math just doesn't work." Fortunately for us all, it is part of our faith that diversity of opinions doesn't mean divisiveness.

Leslie's Column

As you have read in *Carolyn's Column*, we will be making the monthly treasurer's reports available, to those members who are interested, via our website:

www.bigflatsuu.org. The report is actually cumulative, each column representing a month in our fiscal year, which runs from July through June. At this writing, November is not yet over, so only the year through October is available.

The various receipts and expenditures are listed only as categories. If you would like more information on any line item or dollar amount, please ask me. Accompanying notes appear at the bottom of the spreadsheet to explain certain budget items for that month. These do not accumulate like the money figures, but change every month.

Again, just ask if anything puzzles you.

You may have noticed or taken part in congregation members' counting the collections every week and filling out small tabulation slips to go with the money. Doing this was strongly recommended in the UUA treasurer's

handbook as a fiscal policy that protects both the treasurer and the Fellowship against accusations of theft or fraud. So if you're asked to count the money, you now know why!

In mid-December, I'll be sending out the usual mailing telling members how much they've contributed this fiscal year toward their pledge, as well as how much our records show that they've given in the calendar year—the latter for tax purposes. (It doesn't include cash donations, like Sunday collections.) Let me know as soon as possible if our records disagree! Some of you, I'm certain, will be surprised to see that there is a zero on the line for "pledged amount." In such a case, you may believe that you've pledged, but in fact I have nothing on paper, in email, or otherwise to indicate that. If you do not get a letter at all, it means that I have no record of any contributions for this fiscal year so far, or for the calendar year 2012. And, of course, any contributions made after the letters are sent out (or, even better, hand-delivered on a Sunday) will not be included in the amounts on the letter you receive. (I really didn't have to tell you that!)

Thank you for supporting your fellowship (and UUA and St. Lawrence District)!


REMINDER
